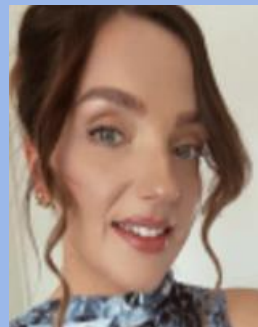

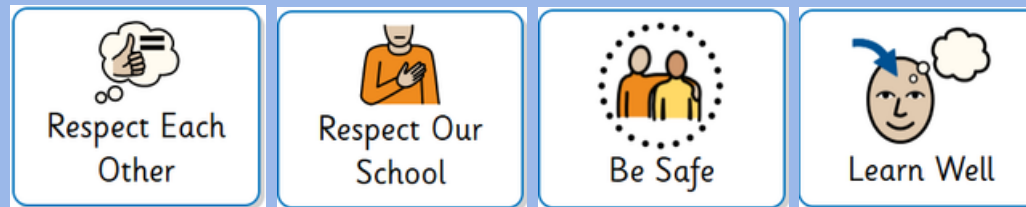




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Behaviour and Expectations

Every behaviour is a form of **communication**.



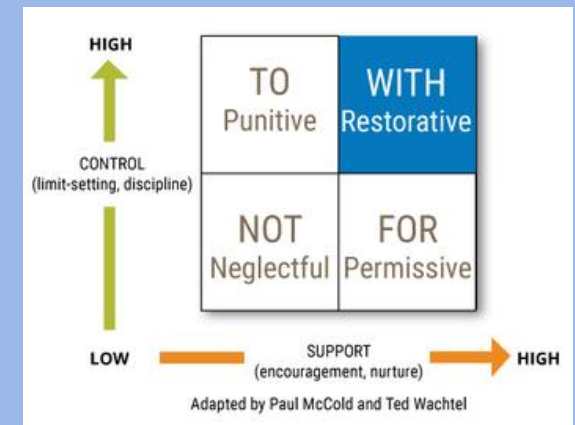
Positive behaviour is noted with public or private praise, supported with stickers, Dojo points, personalised comments and contact made with parents, either by the class teacher or by a member of the Senior Leadership Team.



ClassDojo

We are a **restorative practice school**.

We focus on building and maintaining positive relationships. When negative behaviour impacts a relationship, we look into the consequences of such actions and what is needed to restore the relationship and limit the possibility of the behaviour happening again.





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Behaviour and Expectations



We expect high standards of behaviour, both in and out of the classroom. To encourage this, we empower our children to be **Magical Movers**- moving in and around the school in a sensible and courteous way.

Each week, the class that has been moving around our school, respectfully, quietly and modelling the behaviour we want to see from all our children, wins the

Magical Movers Trophy!

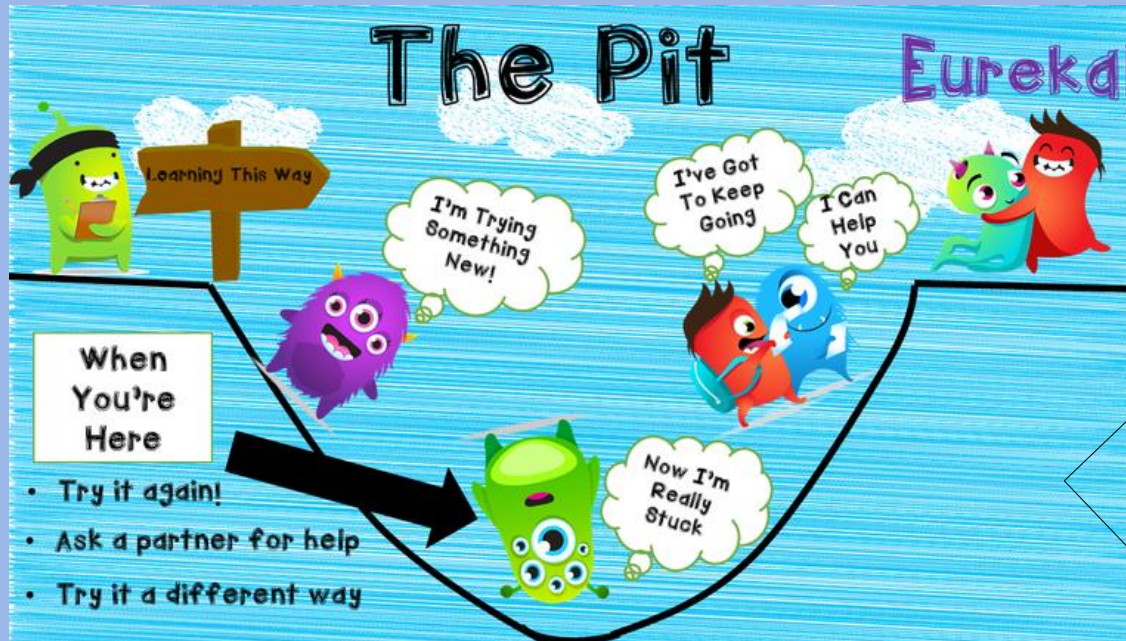


“You get more of the behaviour you notice most, ” (Paul Dix)

The Cambridge Oracy Skills Framework

Classroom oracy strategies least often used:-

- Encouragement to use new words
 - Turn taking
 - Listening skills
- (Dockrell et al. 2012)

Better self-confidence & self-esteem.

Increased understanding of social issues & relationships

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Uniform

- Grey trousers, skirt or pinafore
- White shirt (polo shirt is summer uniform only Easter-Oct)
- School tie
- Navy blue cardigan or V neck jumper
- Tights or socks (school colours)
- Sensible dark coloured shoes (no boots over the ankle)
- Hair style- plain style, no shaved markings or gel etc.
- Hair that can be tied back should be - this is for safety/to reduce incidents of lice.
- No nail varnish
- No jewellery (religious reasons, please see teacher), only stud earrings that should be removed by child for PE

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Home Learning

(Homework)



Reading Books will be changed on a Monday and Thursday. We expect your child to read 4x a week at home. Sometimes we will send home a book that you will need to share with your child (this is for them to listen to rather than read). Please also comment in your child's school planner so we are aware of how they are progressing at home.

We will not be sending out phonics homework – teaching and assessment will be carried out in school.



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General Information:

Ensure all belongings come in a book bag (EYFS/Year 1) or small rucksack.

Uniform; please make sure everything is named!

Water Bottles; these need to be clearly named and filled with fresh drinking water every day.
The children will have access to this throughout the day.

Please check emails regularly and ensure notifications for Class Dojo are switched on incase of reminders/updates.

PE Kits - please make sure your child has the correct PE Kit. Children will need to come into school wearing their PE kit on their PE days.

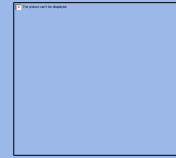
Please ensure no toys or other belongings come into school.



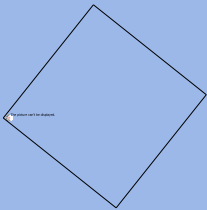
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How can you help from home?

Reading books with your child at home x4 a week (newspapers, e-books, recipes, instructions).



Create a safe space to talk - somewhere quiet with a special object or a 'safe adult'. This could be a friend or relative who they can talk to about any worries they may have.



Talk about feelings and acknowledging them. Remind them that whatever their feelings, you will love and support them always.



Everyday Maths - cooking, pay for things with money, 'wonder' about things, get them a watch to tell the time, give them chores and encourage them to work hard.

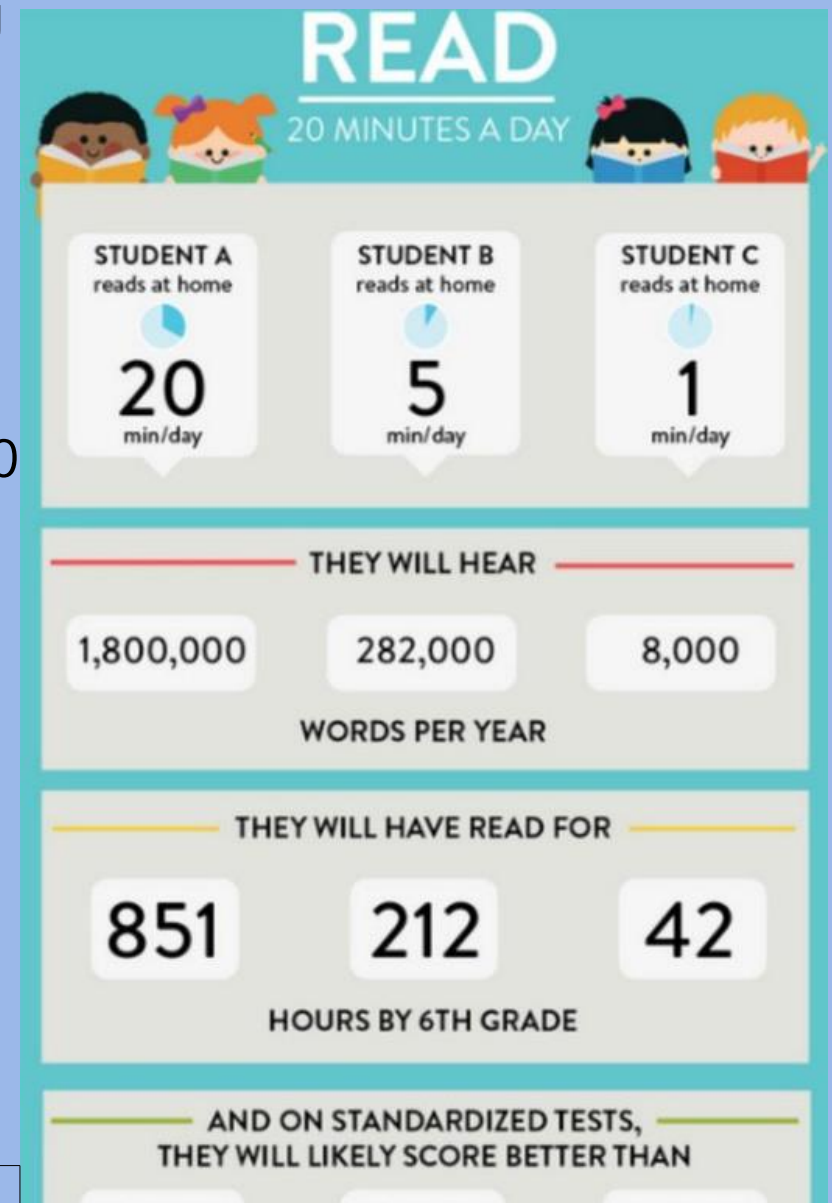


St Gregory's 'Reading Rules'

- All children MUST be reading at least 4 times a week at home.
- Parents need to 'make a mark' in reading records each time.
- Class Teachers will be monitoring this weekly.
- Children will receive rewards if they achieve this goal each week!

Reading is the **KEY** to learning

- By the age of two, children learn a new word every two hours. This means that by the time they start school, they should be familiar with over 10,000 words. This is why talking to your children and reading bedtime stories is so important.
- There is a difference in reading performance equivalent to just over a year of schooling between young people who never read for enjoyment and those who read for up to 30 minutes per day.
- Children who often read books at age 10, and more than once a week at age 16, gain higher results in Maths and English than those who read less regularly.
- Reading stories about diverse characters and situations helps children develop empathy and a better understanding of the world around them.
- Regular reading sessions help improve a child's concentration span - a skill crucial for academic success and various aspects of life.

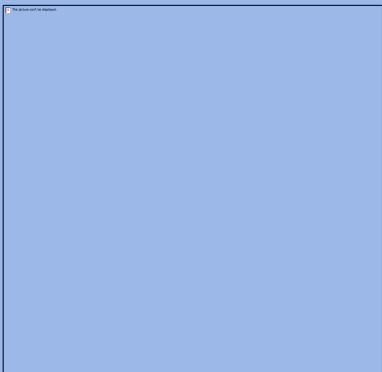
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Communication with us...
